






Many people visiting the SVR don't readily appreciate that the cost of their tickets and the money they spend in the Railway's shops, cafes and pubs only pays for the day-to-day running costs.

It cannot stretch to cover the huge restoration costs of locomotives, carriages, track and infrastructure, or to train engineering apprentices.

For example, it will cost an extra:

£600,000+ to overhaul and restore a steam locomotive

Up to £90,000 to restore a heritage carriage

£1.25 million to restore our ageing viaduct at Falling Sands

£21,000 a year to train an engineering apprentice

The Severn Valley Railway Charitable Trust is helping to find the money needed for these and other essential projects.



# The impact we've had at the Railway

£300,000	for carriage restoration
£300,000	for the Heritage Skills Training Academy
£150,000	towards 'Hagley Hall' locomotive, including £95,000 secured from the Heritage Lottery Fund

The Heritage Lottery Fund set us a challenge; if we could secure £500,000 in donations, they would match them, pound for pound, to raise a total of £1 million to invest for the Railway's future. But we only had until June 2017 to do it.

The generosity and passion of our supporters was nothing short of overwhelming. So much so, that we'd made it to £1 million several weeks before the deadline had expired. This money is invested in our endowment Future Fund, and is generating income to pay for essential restoration work on the SVR's rolling stock and infrastructure in the years to come.

We could not have done any of this without the inspirational response of our supporters. Some people signed up to give a regular amount each month, and many of these were so impressed with our work that they pledged to continue their monthly gift even after the expiry of the HLF match funding offer. Others made a single gift of whatever they could manage. Every pound that we received (along with an extra 25% Gift Aid if the donor is a taxpayer) was doubled by HLF and invested into our Future Fund. It's going to make all the difference to the way in which the SVR can plan ahead and future-proof its continuing existence.

It was hard to miss the news of Flying Scotsman's visit to the SVR in September 2016, and as well as raising £85,000 for the Charitable Trust, we also made history! This was the first occasion since 1964 on which this iconic loco had hauled a full rake of nine teak carriages by Sir Nigel Gresley, who also designed Flying Scotsman itself. All these beautifully restored coaches are owned by the Charitable Trust, which made it an extra pleasure to be able to share this special occasion with so many of our supporters.

The day attracted a huge amount of press coverage and helped us to raise the profile of the SVR as a major heritage attraction, and to highlight the Charitable Trust's important role in ensuring the Railway's long-term survival.

## award from DfT to transform wheelchair accessibility

The Department for Transport thought our plan to upgrade the SVR's wheelchair accessibility was so good, they selected us for an award of £75,000 towards its costs. A Charitable Trust team travelled to London to make a Dragons' Den style presentation to the DfT judging panel, beating off intense competition from across the UK.

A largely volunteer team has been working at Bridgnorth on the massive job of restoring and converting the previously disused 4399 into a wheelchair coach. Project manager and Chairman of the Charitable Trust Hugh McQuade says they've faced a sizeable challenge:

"The coach had suffered a great deal from being stored outside for 20 years, and had become severely corroded. We've had to entirely rebuild the south end, including the gangway, to deal with this. We're replacing all the windows, and re-veneering the interior, before re-upholstering



the seating with a 1950s reproduction moquette. Finally we'll paint the exterior, in carmine and cream, with imitation gold, authentic to the coach's original livery"

The Charitable Trust devised this project in the knowledge that many of our passengers have mobility issues, so

we're planning ahead to properly accommodate them and their families when they visit. We've also purchased new lightweight ramps for each of the SVR's fleet of wheelchair coaches, and



early in 2018 work will start to convert coach 80776 into a first class wheelchair-accessible dining car, as Hugh explains:

"There'll be an innovative zig-zag layout for the tables so that the accommodation will be as flexible as possible.

Both these coaches

are now owned by the Charitable Trust, and by the time the project is completed in 2018, we believe the SVR's on-train wheelchair facilities will be the best in the heritage rail sector!"

# Keeping the track on track

The Charitable Trust has contributed £120,000 to track re-laying in the past few years. Keith Brown is one of the 18 Permanent Way volunteers who worked on this year's section, just north of Hampton Loade station:

"Each section of steel rail is 60 feet long and they weigh a tonne apiece. You'd certainly know about it if one tapped you on the shoulder! Seriously, good spatial awareness is a key requirement of the job. And a willingness to work outdoors in all weathers.

"Each week we inspect every single mile of track, so we can pick up on issues before they become problems." £120,000

### Repairing Sandbourne Viaduct

This impressive 10-arched structure has stood to the south of Bewdley since 1860. Made from local sandstone which is very vulnerable to erosion, the viaduct has needed ongoing repairs. The Charitable Trust has given  $\pounds60,000$  towards stonework restoration on the viaduct. With the generous support of donors, we hope to make further contributions to the continuing programme of repairs to both this and the Wribbenhall viaduct to the north of Bewdley.



### Getting the Toad out of the hole

The LNER Carriage Group volunteers took pity on a dilapidated GWR Toad brake van, and when 17410 was transferred to the ownership of the Charitable Trust, the scene was set for restoration. Project manager Richard Gunning takes up the tale:

"We were amazed by the sheer extent of rust and decay in the vehicle, which

hasn't had an in-depth overhaul since it was built in Swindon in 1940.



"Our other challenge is finding up to £15,000 to pay for materials. We're still actively fundraising, and donations made through the Charitable Trust at syrtrust. org.uk will attract 25% Gift Aid at no extra cost."

Look out for the Toad back in service on the Railway from early 2018.

## Just in time: an SVR triumph for 52255

In summer 2016 there was a growing sense of urgency in the Kidderminster Carriage & Wagon paint shop. The last of the Charitable Trust's Gresley teak carriages, 52255, was still undergoing restoration and the honour of the SVR rested on getting it finished in time to join the Flying Scotsman train (see page 7.) Head of C&W and Charitable Trustee David Mead explains how they pulled off this amazing feat:

"We completely re-jigged our work schedule; 50 or so Kidderminster volunteers were involved, plus members of the Bewdley-based LNER Carriage Group and staff from other parts of the Railway. The SVR did it again, turning out another superb restoration job."



Finding out that Hagley Hall's cylinder blocks were beyond repair was one thing. However, as 4930's volunteer engineering co-ordinator Martin White explains, the problem didn't end there:

"No patterns have survived to cast new cylinder blocks, and no drawings could be traced either! Fortunately, we're in contact with a talented design engineer who'd already produced 'new' drawings for other Great Western cylinders. We're confident that with his experience, skills and enthusiasm we'll be able to reverse engineer the new cylinder blocks for Hagley Hall."

The Heritage Lottery Fund made a grant of £95,000 towards the Hagley Hall project, and the Charitable Trust has successfully negotiated with HLF for an extension to the original completion date. The

Friends of Hagley Hall Group has itself already raised £110,000.

Acting Chairman, Paul Hobson, explains that until you really get stuck into a loco overhaul, there's no way of knowing what's involved:

"We take it all in our stride. The project costs have gone from £400,000 to £600,000 but we're continuing our ongoing fundraising efforts to help meet the new cost. With a new completion date, and a 10 year boiler certificate in place from 2020, we're hoping Hagley Hall will still be in full steam to celebrate its 100th birthday in 2029!"

# Diesel and the Charitable Trust

### A solid working partnership

We were delighted when judges at the Heritage Railway Association unanimously voted the Kidderminster Diesel Depot as the winner of their 2016 Modern Traction award. The Trust contributed towards the cost of building the state-of-the-art diesel maintenance facility, which is undoubtedly the envy of many a mainline operator! In the words of the HRA judges, the Depot makes a "major contribution to modern traction preservation".

The Charitable Trust is working with the Diesel Groups to maximise their ongoing fundraising activities. For example, donation buckets at the 2016 and 2017 Diesel Galas and the 2017 Open House event have netted more than £9,400. Donations made to Diesel via the Charitable Trust attract an extra 25% Gift Aid, a significant boost to the fundraising efforts. Chairman of the Diesel Committee Jonathan Dunster says:

"Keeping up the fundraising momentum is vital so that we can build workshop facilities and an amenity block for the volunteers and staff who word so hard to maintain the Railway's essential and valuable diesel fleet."




- the quest for Falling Sands



It could have been a severe setback when our original application for Heritage Lottery funding to restore the Falling Sands Viaduct was not successful. However, HLF indicated some very specific ways in which we could strengthen our bid, and they encouraged us to re-apply. We didn't need asking twice!



HLF wanted to see a much stronger programme of community engagement around the restoration project, as well as an emphasis on the social history and importance of steam railway to the region. By the time we submitted our second application, we had a raft of ideas and proposals for activities, events, exhibitions and projects, all of which would see us working closely with schools and local interest groups throughout and after the restoration work. By speaking to dozens of organisations including community groups, schools, businesses, and arts, history and civic groups, not to mention around 700 Railway volunteers, we found overwhelming



from all quarters.

Our sheer determination has paid off! In June 2017, HLF announced they were extremely keen to support our bid, and would be awarding us a first tranche of funding so that we can further develop and refine our plans. They'll make the final decision on the rest of the £1 million award in September 2018.

In the meantime, we're launching a major fundraising campaign to secure the additional £250,000 that will be needed for this exciting project.

seeped into its seven arches, causing the brickwork to crack and erode, and the mortar joints to crumble. There's already a 20 mph speed limit on trains crossing the viaduct, and things can only get worse. Forced closure of the viaduct would cut off Kidderminster from the rest of the line. Losing this essential operational hub, which houses our historic fleet of carriages, the Diesel Depot, mainline connection, and the point of departure for 80% of our visitors, would compromise the entire future of the SVR. It would be simply unthinkable.



Apprentices within the SVR's Heritage Skills Training Academy work and learn across the different departments; locomotive running, boiler shop, carriage mechanical and carriage bodywork. For their first two years, they rotate around the departments, then specialise in one of the areas. Alongside their on-the-job training, they work towards

George Brogan is in the second year of his apprenticeship and is still rotating around the different departments:

nationally recognised NVQ 2 and 3 qualifications.

"I thrive on the atmosphere of heavy engineering. It might be noisy and dirty but nothing beats the satisfaction of seeing a loco you've worked on, once it's back out in full steam on the Railway.

"Carriage mechanical is next on the rotations for me and I'm looking forward to that too. Every department here has totally opened my eyes to something new. It's going to be tough deciding where I would like to specialise next year."

Max Green is in the final year of his apprenticeship and has specialised in locomotive engineering:

"My work is incredibly varied. One week I could be making new sets of piston glands, the next machining joints for a steam valve. I especially enjoy the fabrication aspects of what I do, like working on the drag box of

"It's been great to get the support of volunteers and paid staff, they really do want to help us achieve as apprentices."

The Railway will recruit two new apprentices to the Academy in 2018.

The HSTA was set up as a pioneering venture in 2013 to help address the inevitable decline in heritage engineering skills at the SVR.

Since the Academy was established, the SVR Charitable Trust has played a key role in its funding and currently we pay the majority of the Academy's costs.

# Turning heads, and locos, at Bridgnorth

If you've visited Bridgnorth station recently you'll have seen that it's undergoing a huge transformation. A newly built refreshment room and restroom facilities, in a1900s Great Western building style, are set to open in late summer 2017, and in the original station building there are big improvements to the layout for the Railwayman's Arms and the shop.

We're getting very excited about the next phase of the transformation, because this will see the installation of a restored turntable in the locomotive yard. The Charitable

Trust will help fund this, so that for the first time ever, the SVR will be able to turn locomotives at the north end of the Railway. This will be a huge attraction for visitors, and an invaluable operational asset.

The Railway's 2016 Share Offer has funded the bulk of the costs of the Bridgnorth development, but the Charitable Trust is also making a significant contribution. Many people are donating to Bridgnorth through the Trust, and of course this method has the added advantage of attracting 25% Gift Aid at no extra cost to the donor.






# In Loving Memory


